



A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT,

The new year has started and we are preparing for another year of growth and prosperity for Lake Lanier and the Lake Lanier Association. We have been working diligently to create strategies and work plans to specifically:

- Enhance and improve our communications
- Build relationships with elected public officials and agencies
- Expand and process improve our lake initiatives

The first of our strategies involved hiring an additional resource to support plans to increase the frequency and scope of our information sharing and educational communications. A good example of this is included in this newsletter where you will find an article on page 9 that focuses on the deterioration of water quality in Lake Lanier. Please take time to read our initial effort to create awareness of this complex issue. It suggests we can all contribute to the solution with a perspective that “an ounce of prevention is worth a pound

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of cure”. Other examples are the January webinar we hosted with Tim Rainey, USACE Operations Project Manager for Lake Lanier and the robust calendar of events planned for the year to inform and educate on a variety of issues and opportunities.

The second strategy is to strengthen existing connections and build relationships with the many newly elected officials in our Lake Lanier Community. We have two new U.S. Senators, two new Congressional Representatives and four new State Legislators representing our members and the constituencies surrounding Lake Lanier. We have already started by meeting with U.S. Representative Andrew Clyde and his staff to highlight our need for his support with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. These relationships will become increasingly important if the Water War with Florida ends sometime in 2021 and the dialogue to raise the full pool level for Lake Lanier re-emerges.

The third strategic thrust is to expand and process improve our existing on-lake initiatives, most notably expanding our Life Jacket Loaner Program, improving our Solar Lights monitoring process, enacting siltation ordinance improvements utilizing the Best Practice model adopted by Hall Co., conducting our 33rd Annual Shore Sweep Program, additional Island Rip Rap installations, creating more awareness of the dock dumping issue and continuing our efforts to keep Lake Lanier CLEAN FULL SAFE!

Whew! It’s a full plate of activity but we are up to the task. Why? Because we have a fantastic Board of Directors who volunteer their talent and time to make all these plans work. And most importantly, we also have you, our members who have demonstrated support and commitment. Your membership dues and a spirit of volunteerism play a significant role in the execution of our programs.

Stay tuned and know that we are working hard for you to keep Lake Lanier CLEAN FULL SAFE!!! Thank you for being part of the team. I look forward to another action packed and fun filled year on Lake Lanier. Stay safe and thanks again for being an integral part of the Lake Lanier Association.

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

New Phase of Island Erosion Protections Beginning in 2021



We have successfully protected 12 islands and nearly two miles of shoreline from erosion. A new round of island erosion and sedimentation protections is slated to begin this year starting with input from you. With 39,000 acres and over 100 islands we can't see everything and we want to hear from our members regarding which islands you believe are experiencing an increased rate of erosion and in need of protection.

We will take input online starting Monday March 8th through the Annual Member Celebration on April 17th. After the nomination period closes, we will compile a comprehensive list of islands to consider. We will then work to partner with the University of North Georgia to utilize GIS imagery to determine the rate at which the islands have suffered erosion. This erosion rate and determination of need will be a key parameter in determining the final list of islands in this phase. In addition to the erosion rate we

must consider funding availability, project feasibility and other key factors in determining which islands will be included in the newest phase. We want to be sure that everyone understands we are soliciting input however we are not going to be able to do them all. If we are unable to add an island that you nominate to this round, we will keep it as a suggestion for any future rounds that we complete.

Why Islands? Waves from wind and vessels take a toll on the islands shoreline. We have chosen to protect the islands because they are for the use and enjoyment of everyone on the lake. There is always the argument that all of the shoreline is owned by the Corps, however substantial public and private investment goes into this project and therefore, we want to ensure an equal benefit for everyone.

Meeting with Colonel Joly U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Mobile District Commander

On January 27th LLA held our annual stewardship meeting with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineer Mobile District Commander, Colonel Joly. This was the second year in a row that we met to discuss initiatives on Lake Lanier and ways that the Lake Lanier Association and the Corps of Engineers could continue to strengthen partnerships. Colonel Joly was supportive of the work that took place in 2020 and was equally supportive of the plans that we have set forth for 2021. This was especially true for the solar lights program and enforcement of the shoreline management plan for dumped and derelict docks. We thank Col. Joly for taking the time to discuss these issues as well as the successes that occurred around Lake Lanier.



Life Jacket Loaner Program Update



Wearing life jackets save lives. Building on the successful launch of our pilot Life Jacket Loaner Stations in 2020 at Mary Alice Park in Cumming, we are excited and looking to expand our efforts in 2021. We are currently working with the good folks at Forsyth County Parks and Recreation to identify locations to expand our program with an additional two stations located at one or more of the Forsyth County Parks with swim and boat access on Lake Lanier. Our intent would be that these new stations would be available and operational by Memorial Day, and would remain operational through the traditional lake season ending on Labor Day. As a reminder, each station is stocked with infant, child, youth, and adult sizes for life jackets. We'll keep you posted as we finalize our agreement on the new locations.




One of the Life Jacket Loaner Stations currently located at Mary Alice Park in Cumming.

Our hope is that by having life jackets available for borrowing and returning that we can help create a safer environment for people to enjoy the Lake Lanier experience. We will continue to inspect and restock the life jackets on an ongoing basis, while gaining experience and feedback. We continue to desire ongoing expansion of the program in the future to include other parks and boat launch areas around the lake.

We appreciate all of those who have inquired about donating life jackets for our stations. Unfortunately, at this time, we are not in a position to accept your generous donations. We hope to be in the future once we work through a few logistical challenges. We need to have increased Life Jacket inventory storage, inspections of the donated jackets, and to make sure the jackets we use are consistent with the directions for use located on the signage at each of the stations. As we continue to gain experience, we will continue to consider a life jacket donation program, and will also be looking for opportunities to bring on interested businesses, government entities, and other charitable interests/foundations to sponsor additional stations.

We would like to hear from anyone who is interested in volunteering alongside our LLA team to help with the ongoing inspection, tracking, and restocking of the life jackets at any of our stations. The need would be for a once a week drive by at one or more of our stations between Memorial Day and Labor Day 2021. Training would be provided, and life jackets will be provided by LLA. 
2020 was quite a year and I know we are all glad to move on! For those of us who are fortunate enough to live at or near the lake, we are especially grateful this year for our beautiful lake that has provided so much peace and joy to us during this time.

Good news! In 2020, Lake Lanier real estate experienced a 22% increase in sales activity and 21.7% price increase, in a year of Covid-19 pandemic, political and civil unrest, and unusually high rain. Buyers sought refuge at the lake from crowded cities to work, school and recreate from a new lake home. With historically low interest rates buyers traded up to more house and Sellers happily down sized while benefitting from a quick, stress free sale. 2020 has been the lowest lake inventory I have seen in 20 years. Buyers migrating from locked down states recognized the value and scooped up luxury buys tripling luxury sales for an all-time record. Although we have no crystal ball, if Sellers act on selling in 2021 it could be another winning year for both lake Sellers and Buyers.


◆ 510 lake homes with private docks or homes in neighborhoods with marina style dock access sold in 2020, a 40% increase over 2019. 401 lake homes with private docks closed vs 329 last year, a 22% increase.

◆ The average sales price for a home with a private dock was \$781,697, an increase of 21.7%. The average sales price of all Lake Lanier homes, including homes in neighborhoods with boat slips at neighborhood marinas, was \$650,000, a 5% increase overall.

◆ The average sales to list price was 96.2% and Days on Market was 75, compared to last year's 95.7% and 108 Days on Market.

Luxury Lake Is Hot: Luxury lake sales really took off in 2020. 160 homes over \$800,000 sold vs 88 in 2019. A record 90 homes over \$1,000,000 sold vs only 26 in 2019! Days on market was just 97 days, and the list to sales price was 94.5%. Some homes sold at full price or more with multiple offers, predominately in the \$800,000 to \$1,200,000 range. Luxury homes made up 31% of lake homes sales against last year's 17%. It was a seller's market with on average only 40 homes available at a time. In years past there have been over 100 homes on the market for buyers to choose from.



2020 LAKE LANIER Real Estate in Review


Second Home Demand Increased in the Pandemic: With “work at home” and “school at home” in 2020, it is not surprising Lake Lanier has seen many more buyers wanting a safe haven away from the cities. Lake Lanier never shut down and was a safe haven that enabled residents to enjoy outdoor recreation, while working and schooling from home. Many buyers are still chasing that elusive lake cottage under \$500,000, IF they can find it. These properties are scooped up in a day or two and with multiple offers, so act fast when you see it.

Migration from Other States: Lake Lanier has seen increased migration from out of state buyers leaving pandemic locked down states for job opportunities, better quality of life and weather, with less restrictions and taxes. Our beautiful lake is attractive to those moving from other waterfront areas and Buyers see our prices as more appealing.

Boat Dock Upgrades, Safety and Maintenance: Boats are getting larger and making larger wakes due to the popularity of wake boarding and wake surfing. There are only about 30 days a year of big traffic days, but homeowners are seeing the need to maintenance and replace old docks to adapt to the increased lake activity and larger boats. Homes with newer docks with larger boat slips are in demand and well maintained and safe docks are better received by Buyers.



Lake Home Trends: Updated kitchens and baths have been a top priority for lake buyers for years. With the pandemic, we are now seeing the resurgence of the home office(s) and zoom spaces as work and school at home have been in the spotlight. Buyers also are attracted to comfortable outdoor spaces such as covered decks and patios, pools, hot tubs, fireplaces and firepit areas.



Multi-Slip Subdivisions Gain Popularity: New and existing lake neighborhoods with marina style docks were hot as builders’ spec homes, custom builds and resales hit the market, contributing to a 40% in increase in total lake homes sold.

The Lake is at Risk and Why You Should Care

CLEAN LAKE, FULL LAKE, SAFE LAKE. You know our mantra and LLA wants you to know what our plan is to support the all-important first element. Over the years, LLA has successfully implemented programs like Adopt-A-Lake, Shore Sweep, ADDV and Erosion and Sedimentation to all work together to ensure we have a Clean Lake. While these efforts have made an impact, there is much more to be done to ensure the ongoing and future health of Lake Lanier. Trash, nutrients, sedimentation, harsh chemicals and E. coli all deteriorate Lanier's water quality. Below we have detailed the issues with three of these pollutants. As LLA members, we ask that you take a look at these concerns and join us in our Clean Lake Campaign efforts to keep Lake Lanier clean for generations to come.



EROSION AND SEDIMENTATION

Sediment entering the lake clogs wildlife habitat and carries with it phosphorous and nitrogen into the lake. Once the sediment reaches Lanier, the nutrients attached to the soil are released into the water. This contributes to the nutrient loading of the lake detailed below, exacerbating algae levels.

E. COLI

Another form of pollution that has potentially serious health effects is Escherichia coli (E. coli), a bacteria that normally lives in the intestines of warm blooded animals. While E. coli is usually harmless or causes only relatively brief sickness, a few strains can cause severe symptoms and require medical attention especially for children or the elderly. E-coli does not typically thrive in a lake environment, though it is suggested to avoid contact with the water 24-48 hours after a heavy rain. E-coli can be found along shorelines where an abundance of wildlife, such as geese are located on the shoreline or upstream. We can all help control the presence of E. coli in the lake. While geese, cattle, and chicken houses contribute. Pet waste, septic tanks, sewer spills, and improperly operated marine toilets are also sources. People can help by cleaning up after their pets and by properly maintaining and operating septic systems and marine toilets.

ALGAE & PHOSPHOROUS

The most concerning factors negatively affecting Lake Lanier's water quality is an increasing level of


phosphorus in the water, which in turn is causing an increase in algae growth. Algae are photosynthetic aquatic organisms that range from microscopic, single-celled organisms to large seaweeds. An "algae bloom" is a rapid increase in the population of algae and is primarily caused by an excessive volume of nutrients such as phosphorus and nitrogen. An abundance of algae can also cause harmless yet disagreeable taste and odor issues in our drinking water.

The majority of algae in Lake Lanier is non filamentous nontoxic algae species. This means even at higher levels it does not create a mat on the water but can be seen as a green tint in the water.

Chlorophyll a Testing

We monitor algae levels by measuring levels of Chlorophyll a, a pigment contained in plants, algae, and cyanobacteria. Chlorophyll a is often used as a surrogate for algae growth because it provides a ready means of monitoring algae levels. Chlorophyll a levels vary with water volume and temperature, and are usually higher when temperatures and rainfall are high. Lake Lanier's Chlorophyll a readings have been rising, especially since 2017. The testing results are detailed in the following graph. The northern sections of the lake, Bolling Bridge and Lanier Bridge have the highest allowed concentrations, 10ppm with the allowable limits decreasing to 5ppm at Buford Dam. This decrease relates to the volume of water to nutrient concentrations in each location.

In Lake Lanier, phosphorus has been identified as the primary cause of the increase in algae. High phosphorus content in Lanier is largely due to nonpoint source runoff from urban areas (e.g., streets, parking lots, and lawns that have been fertilized) and agricultural lands (e.g., cattle, fields and chicken houses). Point sources such as wastewater treatment facilities also contribute. The state produced a document that details the sources of phosphorus from around the lake and sets the maximum levels of phosphorous that should enter Lake Lanier to still maintain the lake's water quality. This document is a good guideline for where to approach the issue of rising phosphorous levels, though it does not create a direct road map to a solution.



Blue-Green Algae Blooms appeared in Lanier for the first time in 2020.

One of the more dangerous forms of algae is various species of Cyanobacteria, the so-called blue-green algae. Blue-Green algae blooms can produce toxins. In 2020 there were nine small blue-green algae blooms visually confirmed on Lake Lanier. One bloom was tested and verified to be Cyanobacteria which was producing a low level of the toxin microcystin. The significance of this lies in the fact that this was the first time that these types of blooms were documented in Lanier. Certain species of algae can produce toxins that can sicken or kill dogs, fish, mammals, and birds, and in extreme cases may cause human illness.

These blooms were all located in isolated areas and are very visually distinct. They are bright green in nature and appear almost like spilled paint in the water. The fact that they are so distinct allows them to be easily avoided. Please report to us if you see any suspected blue-green blooms.

The water quality of Lake Lanier is a growing concern, but the lake is still safe to use for swimming, boating and as a source of properly sanitized drinking water. LLA has been studying the situation and strategizing on how it can not only help maintain a CLEAN LAKE but help restore Lake Lanier to lower levels of Chlorophyll a, phosphorus, E. coli, and other deleterious substances. Our strategies will be evolving as we gather more knowledge and expertise, but our goal is to protect Lake Lanier and all its users.

OUR ACTION PLAN

Collaboration - LLA has long worked with local and state governments such as EPD and local County and City water management agencies on all three elements of our mantra. But we will be expanding our work with not only government officials but other nonprofits and public and private organizations that can help us in our quest to keep the lake clean. We will also be encouraging local governments to adopt best practices, like Hall County's newly-revised storm water ordinance requiring double-row silt fences and hay bales on all developments bordering the lake.

Education - LLA members must be actors, too – it will take all of us working together to find and be the solution. There are practical steps you can take to improve water quality; including proper maintenance of marine toilets, careful cleaners used on boats or docks. raising awareness in the lake issues through webinars, our civic organization meetings.



Member Action - One of been the Clean Lake Pledge, will detail meaningful steps which Lanier watershed can take to protect and preserve the quality of Lake Lanier's water. The newly revised Clean Lake Pledge will be available to take starting at our Annual Member Celebration on April 17.

We will support these actions by consideration of lawn treatments and community about all Clean Lake new website, our newsletter, and

Report a Problem - Using the new LLA website, lake lovers can report a water quality problem on the lake. Once problems are identified LLA collaborates with the respective agencies and organizations to address the concern whenever possible. This is an on-going effort and one we will further develop through the See Something Say Something program rolling out this Spring.

Our preferred course of action is to be a solution builder. We seek to work with LLA members, government authorities and local leaders to find, develop, and implement solutions that are durable, effective, and beneficial for the entire Lake Lanier community. The goal is to ensure that Lake Lanier's water is protected for generations to come, and LLA is committed to being part of the solution, whatever that requires. We encourage you to share this information with your friends and neighbors around the lake. We hope you will support us in this effort and stake your claim to preserving a CLEAN LAKE.
