

Lighting up lake lanier

PROGRAM UPDATE BY TODD BAXTER

Our partner, LS3, has completed their annual overnight inspection of every single solar light installed by LLA on Lake Lanier. Any damaged / missing markers have been reported for repair, and the Corps is working to replace those markers. LLA will continue working with the Corps to ensure timely repair.



LS3 has replaced any lights which were malfunctioning at time of inspection with replacement lights purchased by the LLA. This recent round of inspection and maintenance repairs completes LLA goal to replace non-working lights within the alloted manufacturers warranty period. Today, LLA can proudly say every light on Lake Lanier is now less than 3 years old and a system is in place for proper inspection and replacement each year moving forward.

All of this work is being completed now to ensure each solar light and marker it's attached to are functioning as they should, all before we enter the busy season on Lake Lanier.

Where has all the water gone?

Lanier was above summer Full Pool level on May 1 at 1071.05, down 1.3 ft. from a month earlier. By May 31 it was down to 1068.95, a drop of 2.1 feet. Perhaps you've wondered why.

Most crucial to springtime Lanier levels are, of course, the reservoir's starting point, but also how much, where, and when rain falls in the ACF basin. On March 1, Lanier was at 1070.70, so essentially full. But, according to the U.S. Geological Survey, rainfall during May totaled only 1.61", compared with a historical average of about 4.5".

Compounding the shortfall in rain, during the Gulf sturgeon's spawning season (March to May), the Corps operates Jim Woodruff Dam, the furthest-downstream dam in the system, to support spawning. And while the Corps is trying to provide enough water for the Gulf sturgeon, it is also trying to keep all three conservation reservoirs at comparable levels, relative to their full pools. So, if rainfall is below normal in the middle of the system, then additional flow is taken from the reservoirs upstream to compensate.








The wild card is the Flint River, which spans about 55% of the ACF's drainage basin above Lake Seminole, the farthest-downstream dam in the system. The Flint has no dams and therefore cannot be controlled to help manage levels in the conservation reservoirs, including Lanier.

When Flint River flows are low, then Chattahoochee flows have to make up for them – and Lanier, being the farthest-upstream reservoir in the system, is the last resort for stored water. As you can see from the graph (left), the Flint's flows from March through May were below the historical average for all but about two weeks.

The lower-than-normal flows in the Flint required additional water to be released from Buford Dam to maintain minimum required flows at the Florida state line. That, combined with lower-than-normal inflows to Lanier, caused Lanier's level to fall. The good news is that, as of June 1, the Gulf sturgeon spawning season was over and lower flows into the Apalachicola are now happening, as shown on the graph (right):

This should reduce the strain on Lanier, and signs are it is already stabilizing lake levels, as Lanier has dropped only three inches since June 1, as of the date of this writing. If higher-than-normal rains occur – which is possible, given the reestablishment of an El Nino condition in the Pacific – then we could possibly even see levels rise, although that is the opposite of what normally happens in the summer. One can only hope....

Know the Ropes! **Boating Safety & Hospitality** Blend the Two with Humor on Your Next Lake Day

Ahoy! As the temperatures rise and the sun shines on Lanier, we thought it was a great time to discuss how boating safety, and rules to keep family and friends safe around the water, don't have to spoil the fun or make an outing awkward. Rules, as you know, are set in place to protect everyone. Sometimes the rules are set forth by a governing agency, city, state, etc.— or, they may be your personal rules. However, one of the hardest parts of enforcing rules on your dock or vessel, is conveying them without making your guests uncomfortable. You can't exactly hand someone a sweet tea, or a cold beer, and say, "Before we have any fun, let me remind you of the rules". That doesn't exactly set the tone for a fun and relaxing day on the water. However, you can still get your point across with a dash of humor or in more subtle ways where they are not expressed verbally but still clearly communicated.

The first step in conveying the rules is knowing them yourself. Clear expectations and communication is vital for the captain, co-captain and deckhands—these are the ones who are going to be primary users of the boat and/or dock. These folks are the ones who must know the ropes and set the example for everyone else. This can include the youngest members of the family as well! It's never too early to be a leader!

Let's dive in! See what I did there? I made a pun. Puns are great and when used properly, a great way to convey an important message with a dash of humor. Remember, people will remember a corny joke over a somber rule.



Rule #1: Drinking and Boating

We're not saying, "Never drink", we're just saying the day is much more fun when you don't have to worry about anyone getting out of control, getting hurt, or getting sick. Allow plenty of time to stay anchored and enjoy a cold beverage with friends. There's no rush since you're on lake time - and our solar light program is running smoothly to aid in nighttime navigation if you want to stay and enjoy the sunset.

The Rule: Never stock your boat, or cooler, with enough alcohol to inebriate every adult on the boat.

It's in poor taste for a person to consume all the alcohol, especially when supply is limited. If one adult hogs all the alcohol (that's what we call greed if you don't happen to be from around here), they open themselves for criticism, ribbing or casual intervention. This is where a subtle, non-verbal rule can be applied.

Rule #2: Swim with a Float

This one is probably the easiest one ever and has the most potential to avoid disaster. Say it with me, "If you're gonna hang on our boat, you've gotta swim with a float".

The Rule: No one swims without floatation. Ever.

If you're swimming lakeside, simply ask, "Who, in their right mind, enjoys treading water?" then casually offer floatation of

some sort. If you need further reinforcement to state the obvious, you have another option. Try saying, "Here. Use this so you don't get water in your [insert adult beverage here]".

Pro Tip for Your Newest Boaters: Allow your infants and toddlers to wear their life vest in the house or while playing or even napping. This ensures they get used to wearing it and don't associate it with boating or being on the dock - it just becomes a way of life. For kids, a cool life vest will always command attention. Involve your child in the shopping process!



Rule #3: Please Remain Seated During Docking Procedures

As the captain of our vessel, we have our routines. And let's face it—docking is a source of pride. Nothing sparks confidence like docking your boat without incident. How do you avoid incident (and maybe show off your mad skills) when you have a boat full of guests? Easy. Take command of your vessel, Captain!

The Rule: Leave docking to the captain, first mate and/or the deckhands.

When approaching the dock, take advantage of the No Wake Zone. While you've slowed to a nice cruising speed, you can converse without the roar of the engine creating opportunities for misinterpretation. Simply state 'the plan' and add something light like "Please remain seated until the ride comes to a complete stop", or, "This is your captain speaking. We hope you've enjoyed your cruise

aboard the [insert cool boat name here]. We ask that you remain seated to allow the captain and deckhands to show off their mad docking skills". IF you use that last one, be sure your docking skills are, in fact, MAD!

This will avoid injuries that could happen around the dock. When everyone knows their role, disembarking will go a lot smoother. Guaranteed. Clearly stating the plan also ensures you can hurry up and get your name on the list at any one of Lanier's great restaurants!

HOW'S THE MARKET?

All markets are LOCAL, including Lake Lanier. Good news for home owners! Our market is very good, although the dynamics are very different than in past years. A market slow-down from last year's interest rate hikes has not been nearly the factor on Lake Lanier, as it's been in other markets. This has been mostly balanced out by our low inventory levels and high buyer demand. Prices have increased year over year 12.7% this spring. Some of this due to the fact that 44% of the sales are now over a million dollars. This spring we have seen a decrease in home sales of 31%, due to new historical lows in inventory levels. It is clearly a SELLER'S MARKET on Lanier. Looking at South Lake vs North Lake, properties SOUTH of Browns Bridge Rd make up only 39% of the active listings, yet 45% of the sales. Months of supply for South Lake is only 2 months vs 3 months for the overall lake. A balanced market has six months supply of homes. There are only 9 Active listings under a million dollars on South Lake, and a total of 34 on the overall lake. If you know someone thinking of jumping into the summer market, it is a great time to sell a lake home. Enjoy your summer and see you on the lake!

WHERE'S THE MARKET?

So where's the market? And, I don't mean buyers, I mean inventory. Although things have normalized since 2021, our region is seeing more buyer activity than other regions of the country and this will only continue. We have a 38% decrease in home inventory from just a year ago. Clearly, we are all a pretty happy group up here on the lake! Yet, we are still hearing some home owners who need to or want to sell, are sitting on the sidelines, thinking they missed the market of 2021-22. The numbers show differently. 56% of the total lake market is under 1 million dollars. Looking at the inventory, there are only 34 Active homes. The days on market is still under 10 days for these type homes and there is less than one month supply! If you are still wanting to list your home, the timing could not be better.

LUXURY LAKE

In 2022, homes over a million dollars made up 44% of Lake Lanier's sales. The average lake home today sells for \$1,179,361, with 3,759 square feet and four bedrooms and 3 and ½ bath. We've broken the \$3 million ceiling in 2023. With 48 million dollar plus homes closed or pending in 2023, 5 homes sold over \$2 million and 5 homes sold over \$3 million. Luxury buyers are buying full time residences to work from home and also luxury second homes. They are looking for newer construction or quality well maintained homes with some updates. Outdoor living spaces and lake views top the list, with a deep water dock for the boat(s). Large homes with 4-6 bedrooms can still appeal to many buyers, but the larger the home, the lower the dollars per square foot in sales price. The average luxury home sells for \$326 sf. Homes with exceptional lots and views and/or new construction homes are selling for as high as \$450 sf, and a few higher.

Swimming Pools- How many homes sold with pools? 9 Does a home with a pool sell for more money? On Lake Lanier the answer seems to be yes, as the top 5 highest priced homes sold this year had pools. This also may be due to higher priced homes often having larger estate sized lots, allowing for amenities that add value, as in detached garages/workshops, pools & tennis courts.

Is one county more popular to buy in than another? Hall County remains steady at @ 52% of lake home sales. Forsyth county has shifted slightly to 30% from 35%, and Dawson County has shifted up to @ 14% vs 10% in the past. Gwinnet and Lumpkin round out the last 4% of lake home sales.






What's In A Name?

Names begin, naturally, with whatever person or thing they're attached to. People are given names at birth, recorded dutifully on official Certificates, so we know what to call each other. Places are usually named by whatever person with enough clout to make a name stick first visits them.

And so it was with Lake Sidney Lanier. Back in the '50s, the United States Army elected to name the lake after Sidney Clopton Lanier, a 19th century poet, lawyer, academician, and musician who penned The Song of the Chattahoochee, a poem extolling the virtues of the Piedmont region in which his namesake lake later became located.

But names, being arbitrarily assigned to places, are similarly subject to being arbitrarily changed. As the result of a directive from Congress, both the lake and Buford Dam are designated to be renamed because their current names are associated with men who served voluntarily in the Confederate Army. If you've been following this development with LLA, you know that our online poll disclosed that about 97% of respondents oppose changing the name. The overwhelming majority of people believe that the lake and dam were not named to honor the military service of either man, and so should not be dealt with the same way as, say, statues honoring Robert E. Lee for his role as President of the Confederacy and leader of its army in the Civil War. In fact, until the Naming Commission's report came out, very few of us knew that Sidney Lanier or Algernon Buford had even served in that war. For most of us, the distant and tenuous connection between the men's names and their military service is a bridge too far.



What's in the name of our lake? August 1, 2023, will mark 65 years since the lake first reached full pool, so that's 65 years of history, during which the area around Georgia's largest reservoir has evolved from bucolic and agrarian to an urban forest more densely populated by the day, where the burgeoning cities of Gainesville, Cumming, and Dawsonville shine as the lake's beacons drawing people, businesses, and organizations of myriad kinds predominantly because of the presence of Lanier's 39,000 acres of water.


And therein lies the reason why LLA came out against renaming the lake: the name Lanier has become attached to so much over its lifetime that it has become synonymous with the entire area.

Nonetheless, the controversy about renaming continues, despite the "pause" instituted by the Corps of Engineers when opposition to changing the name arose quickly and vociferously. No response to our letters has come from the Secretary of Defense, the Secretary of the Army, or the District Commander of the Corps of Engineers, despite the fact that U.S. Representative Austin Scott - who served on the Naming Commission – has stated that the Commission made a decision not to rename Lake Lanier or Buford Dam. It would seem that there is some lack of communication on this issue between the right and left hands of our federal government.

For now, all LLA can do is to persevere in communicating with the various Defense agencies in the hope of forestalling a name change that has little public support. Those who responded to our poll know that we have suggested the alternative of removing the name Sidney from the lake, leaving in place the name Lanier that has become so inextricably intertwined with the area while eliminating the nexus between it and the Confederacy. Adopting the name Lanier Dam would accomplish the same thing for the edifice that created the lake, no matter how technically unnecessary that change may be.

We will continue to press the issue until it is resolved. For those who feel that a change is appropriate for removing from the lake the stain of rebellion against the principle of equality guaranteed by our Constitution, know that LLA's position is not insensitive to that principle but rather is reflective of the opinion of the vast majority of our members. For we do not persist in order to honor the Confederacy, but to honor the legacy of the first 65 years of Lanier's life, just as a parent honors a child by continuing to use its name given at birth.

The LLA conducted a survey to gather the opinions of the Lake Lanier community regarding the name change of Lake Lanier and Buford Dam. The survey ran for 7 days, from March 10th-16th and 1,171 total responses were collected. Below are some of the results collected. 200FT RULE - NEW WAKESURFING & WAKEBOARDING LAW GOING INTO EFFECT JULY 1st 2023

THE BILL IS KNOWN AS ACT 241

HB 121, co-sponsored by Representatives Anderson, Powell, McDonald, Gunter, Yearta, and Hawkins passed both houses of the General Assembly this past session and was signed by Governor Kemp on May 2. The bill is now known as Act 241 and, according to Representative McDonald's office, will go into effect July 1.

The original purpose of the bill was to increase the "no wake zone" for wakesurfing and wakeboarding. The bill was enlarged to provide regulation of multipurpose off-highway vehicles as well, but the portion of interest to boaters on Lake Lanier provides essentially that wakesurfing and wakeboarding is no longer permitted between sunset and sunrise or within 200 feet of any moored vessel, dock, pier, bridge, or any shoreline adjacent to a residence, park public beach or swimming area, marina, restaurant, or other public use area, and that personal flotation devices must also be warn when surfing a wake or being towed on a board.

THE PERTINENT WORDING OF THE BILL IS AS FOLLOWS:

'Wakeboarding' means the activity of:

(A) Being towed on a board with or without foot bindings by a motorboat across the vessel's wake; or (B) Operating a motorboat in a manner that creates a wake while towing a person on a board with or without foot bindings.

'Wakesurfing' means the activity of:

- (A) Surfing a motorboat's wake, regardless of whether the person is being pulled by a tow rope attached to the motorboat that is producing the wake; or (B) Operating a motorboat in a manner that creates a wake that is capable of being surfed by another person.
- (a) Except as provided in subsection (b) of this Code section, no person shall engage in wakesurfing or wakeboarding upon waters of this state:
- (1) Between sunset and sunrise;
- (2) Within 200 feet of any moored vessel; any wharf, dock, pier, piling, or bridge structure or abutment; or any shoreline adjacent to a full-time or part-time residence, public park, public beach, public swimming area, marina, restaurant, or other public use area; or
- (3) When surfing a wake or being towed on a board, without wearing a personal flotation device.
- (b) This Code section shall not apply to:
- (1) A regatta, boat race, marine parade, tournament, or exhibition for which the commissioner has granted a marine event permit pursuant to Code Section 52-7-19; or
- (2) Intracoastal waterways, rivers, or private lakes."

Mew Logo Revealed! A Note from Amy McGuire, Executive Director

Out with the old and in with the new! At the 2023 Annual Member Celebration, LLA revealed a new logo that will be rolling out in the coming weeks and featured in our new office space, set to open later this year.



Since the reveal, LLA has recieved lots of feedback about the logo and we're thrilled that there has been so much support for the new look. Amy McGuire, Executive Director, took a moment to share more about the logo change and the process, decision making that helped the LLA Team, including Board of Directors and Staff, land on the new logo.

First, we did not enter into this change lightly. We opened the original design to a crowd sourcing resource to obtain over 400 iterations of our original design. **We knew the water, mountains and trees were elements we wanted to maintain** as a nod to the valley that was sacrificed for the greater good. After much market polling and research through community discussions at boat shows and other events, we learned that many people drew a few conclusions about who we are. First, the sailboat was creating the idea that we were a "nautical organization", "sailing club" or a "boating club". Second, the overall logo is nearly identical to the City of Cumming. If we weren't being confused for a boating club, we were being disregarded because people thought we were a "municipal organization" that operated as an extension of the City of Cumming (and their tax dollars!).

The work we do to protect Lake Lanier is extremely important to us. We also realize with it's growing popularity and increasing demand for resources due to area development, the work we do is more important than ever before. In addition, we understand it is going to take the entire community-boaters, non-boaters, consumers, etc. to protect the 38,000 acres and almost 700 miles of shoreline. We wanted to send the message that we are a community-supported organization that is dedicated to protecting the water and all it entails. The water is the primary focus of our new logo because it is where our focus lies. We appreciated the "energy" the graphic provided. The water, to all who reviewed it and provided feedback, appeared to have an energy all its own. The movement that can be observed in the logo was symbolic of the energy we dedicate to keeping Lake Lanier clean, full and safe. All designs were subject to exhaustive review by our board of directors. Final contenders were voted on in our November '22 board meeting.







You may also notice that we added the word "Together" in our tag line. That word is commonly associated with community organizations. We wanted to underscore the message that we can't carry out our initiatives without the support of the community. Our new design is not contained within a shape. From a psychological standpoint, shapes create the perception of "boundaries" or "limitations". Our energy, and enthusiasm, is limitless. Our board of directors are extremely dedicated to this organization and the work we do. Our staff of 3 work well beyond the 40 hour work week to ensure we are doing the best job possible to protect the lake. In addition, we feel a social responsibility to bring the community together and do not want anyone to feel excluded, or confused, by the sailboat that was portrayed in our former design. Despite the lake's reported 12+ million visitors each year, many people do not use the lake for recreation. Instead, they support the ecosystems and resources the water provides. We want them to get involved with us too!

Last but not least, we added 1966, the date of our inception, to our design to celebrate the decades of dedication to the lake. We also added the date as a nod to our founder, Jackie Joseph. Mrs. Joseph was a forward-thinking woman who stepped outside the boundaries that were set for women and created a voice for the lake community. She taught people how to live on the lake since their backyards were unique. Eventually, she established the 501c3 that has become The Lake Lanier Association, an organization designed to protect our area's most valuable resource. To us, the date is one to celebrate! We also want to send the message that we've been around for a bit—that we understand the lake's history, growing economic impact and the resources it provides.

I hope this explanation will help the community understand the need to reconsider our brand image and how it allows us to connect with more lovers of the lake than ever before. Most of all, I hope the community will continue to support the work of the LLA, continue providing feedback on the work we do, and join us in this next chapter.

We have so many exciting changes coming up—each of them designed to help us increase our presence in the community and scale the work we do to keep pace with Lanier's ever increasing popularity.

Miller's Cove Sedimentation to be Dredged

After working for five years with Forsyth County, LLA is expecting McKinley Homes, developer of High Pointe View subdivision near the south end of the lake, to dredge 33.6 cubic yards of sedimentation from the lake by the end of June.



Forsyth County early on documented the illegal sedimentation and notified McKinley that it would be required to perform remediation before a Certificate of Occupancy would be issued for the last 14 homes in the subdivision. But authority for issuing a dredging permit lies with the Corps of Engineers, and LLA has worked hard to raise the Corps' awareness of the importance of requiring removal of the actual sediment at issue including whatever pollutants may be part of it - rather than just an equal volume from somewhere else on the lake. Removing the sediment and all pollutants at issue restores the lake's cleanliness and rectifies the impact to landowners affected by the illegal deposition - often dock permit holders whose lake access has been negatively impacted. By imposing this requirement uniformly on all developers, Local Issuing Authorities (LIAs) can maximize their leverage with developers to avoid illegal sedimentation in the first place, thereby keeping the lake clean while preserving water storage capacity. This is a vital core practice that LLA is asking the Corps and all lake-bordering LIAs to enforce going forward.

LLA will monitor the dredging and hopefully be able to report soon of this long-awaited win for the lake.

Every time it rains, stormwater brings trash off roadsides into rivers and streams that make their way into Lake Lanier. Over 34 years of Shore Sweep cleanups have removed 2.16 million pounds of trash and debris from Lake Lanier's shorelines.
